Youth Plan

- Make certain your child's school or child care provider's emergency contact card is accurate and up-to-date.
- Notify the adults you authorize, of any special medical or dietary requirements your child has.
- Let your child know who will make the pick up at school or child care if you are unable to do so.
- Keep emergency supplies in your car, including comfortable shoes, water and warm jackets.
- Designate an out-of-state contact to relay family emergency information.
- Bring photo ID with you to pick-up your child.

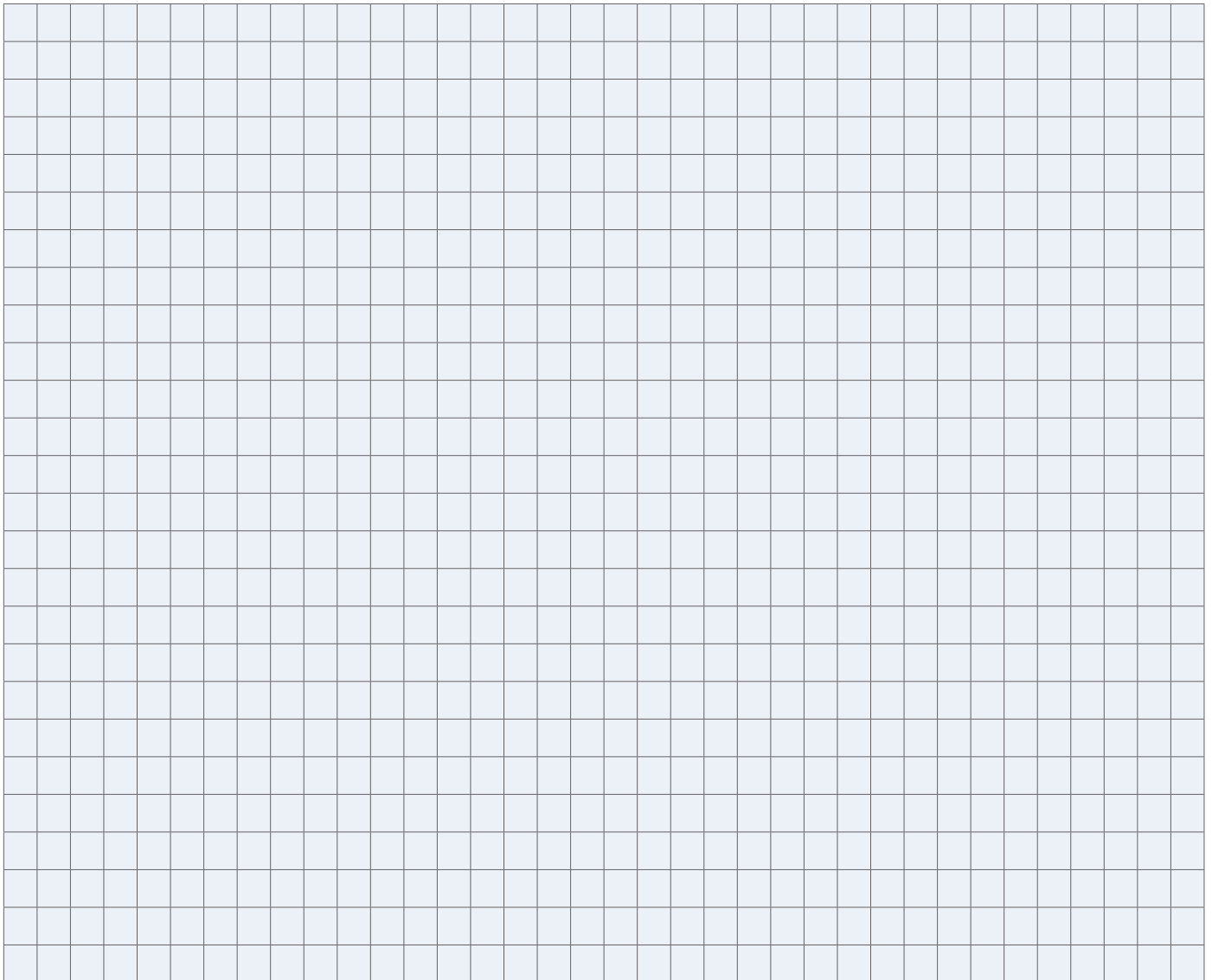

Escape Route & Utilities Plan

Use this page to draw a floor plan of your house. Make a floor plan for each story of your home.

- Indicate primary exits from each room (doors, windows) and include location of escape ladders, ropes, etc.
- Identify location of emergency supplies.
- Mark location of utility valves, circuit breakers or fuses.
- Be sure all family members know where utilities are and how to turn them off.
- Be sure all family members know how to use a fire extinguisher.
- Share your plan with visitors.

Emergency Action Plan

For all emergencies, remember to:

- Stay calm & evaluate your surroundings.
- Turn your portable radio on and listen for instructions.
- Check for injuries (for life threatening injuries only, call 9-1-1).
- Locate flashlights & emergency supplies.
- Wear protective clothing (gloves, goggles, etc.).

Earthquakes and Aftershocks

- Duck, cover and hold.
- Move away from windows, bookshelves, cabinets, and exterior walls.
- If indoors “ride it out” until the shaking stops.
- Pay attention to damaged utilities. Shut off those utilities that are damaged.
- Check for structural damage.
- Check on neighbors.
- Prepare for aftershocks.
- Keep streets clear for emergency traffic.

Fire

- Stay calm - alert neighbors.
- For fires less than 3ft tall use your fire extinguisher.
- Stay out of a burning building.

Shelter in Place

- If outdoors, go indoors; if indoors, stay put.
- Keep pets indoors.
- Bring your family disaster supply kit indoors with you.
- Close all doors, windows and chimney flues.
- Turn off all fans, heating and air conditioning systems.
- Use duct tape and plastic sheeting to seal areas where outside air can enter the house.
- Tune your radio to the emergency broadcast station and listen for instructions.

Evacuation

- Evacuate if told by authorities.
- Take emergency supplies.
- If time permits:
 - Take items listed in next column.
 - Close windows, blinds, and doors.
 - Shut off damaged utilities.
- Lock doors and windows when leaving.
- Listen to your local radio station for shelter sites.

*If time permits, leave a note on the **inside** of your front door, to let others know where you have evacuated.*

Emergency Supplies Plan

- We have food for family members and pets for 3 - 7 days.
- We store camping gear in one place. Tent, lanterns, sleeping bags and stove can double as emergency equipment; if possible store it with your other emergency supplies.
- Each family member has completed and is carrying a wallet size "My Pocket Emergency Plan".
- We have car and workplace mini-survival kits. We have additional supplies in:

- We have a minimum of 2 gallons of water per person per day for at least 3 -7 days. The more water you can store, the better off you will be. Calculate how much water your family needs:

Maintenance Plan

Every six months:

Check and replace as needed:

Batteries for flashlights, smoke detectors, radio, etc.

Review family plans.

Conduct a fire drill.

Rotate water supply.

Every year:

Rotate canned goods.

Update school release forms.

Replace emergency medications.

Every two years:

Review and photograph personal property inventory.

Update insurance policies.

Every three years:

Replace non-fat dry milk.

Replace freeze-dried foods.

Fire Hazard Mitigation Plan

Protecting lives from fire

- We have at least one A-B-C fire extinguisher in our home and know how to use it.
- We have changed the batteries in our smoke detectors.
- We use surge protectors as to not overload our electrical outlets.
- We store flammable liquids in air-tight containers away from ignition sources such as pilot lights. (Example location: outdoor shed)

Landscaping against fire

- We have cleared our property of excess and dead vegetation and highly flammable plants.
- We have trimmed branches that hang over our home.
- We trim grass and vegetation at least 100 feet around our home.
- We have garden hoses connected to outside faucets.
- We store firewood away from our house.

Home maintenance

- Our house numbers are large and easily read from the street.
- We have spark arresters on our chimneys.
- Our roof is fire-retardant.
- We keep leaves and debris out of our rain gutters.

Surviving the event

- My family and I have reviewed the information on the www.usgs.gov website for reducing earthquake damage.

Home preparedness

- We have attached the necessary tools to the utility shut-off valves.
- We have done a home hazard hunt and corrected hazards we found.
